**PUBLIC HEARING:**

On the motion of Trustee Kehoe and seconded by Trustee Weber the public hearing was opened as follows:

**Proposed Local Law “A” of 2021 A local law to amend Chapter 124 Environmental protection standards for residential and recreational marine structures.**

WHEREAS, the Northport Village Board scheduled a public hearing on April 20, 2021 to consider amending the Code of the Village of Northport Chapter 124, Section 124-4 Environmental Protection Standards for Residential Recreational Marine Structures; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 617.5 (c) (33) of SEQRA the adoption of regulation, amending the Code of the Village of Northport is a routine or continuing agency administration and management, not new program or major reordering of priorities and adoption of regulations, policies, procedures, and local legislative decisions in connection with any Type II action, and therefore this proposed board action is a Type II action, requiring no further action pursuant to SEQRA.

## **CHAPTER 124**

### **SECTION 124-4 ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION STANDARDS FOR RESIDENTIAL RECREATIONAL MARINE STRUCTURES**

A. Fixed pier, ramp, and floating dock(s). The following standards and regulations shall apply to the design, construction, and operation of a residential and/or recreational fixed pier, ramp and float as permitted under this chapter.

(1) The maximum overall length of a fixed pier, ramp and float dock structure shall be limited to a distance not to exceed 100 feet extending from a mean high water (MHW) mark to littoral property subject to the rights of the public to provide access for the use of underwater lands to obtain natural resources, including finfish and shellfish, and use of waterways for navigation, recreation, and swimming. Measurements shall be taken from mean high water (MHW) line to extend seaward.

(2) the underside of joists supporting a fixed pier that extends seaward shall be elevated no less than four feet above mean high water.

(3) The deck of a fixed pier shall have a maximum surface width of 48 inches. All proposed decking shall permit the passage of light and water to the area below, unless otherwise authorized by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC).

(4) The areas of the fixed platform/deck shall not exceed 400 square feet. A dock shall not exceed 100 feet in length from a mean high water (MHW) mark and shall not exceed 4 feet in width.

*i. Any application for a fixed pier, ramp, floating dock or fixed platform that seeks to exceed the maximum(s) permitted under Section 124-4(A) (1)(2)(3)(4) shall at the discretion of the Northport Village Board of Trustees be (a) heard by the Northport Village Board of Trustees or (b)referred to the Northport Village Zoning Board to review and act in accordance with the powers granted to them and pursuant to the criteria established Section 124-4(A)(4)(ii)*

*ii. Upon referral from the Northport Village Board of Trustees the Zoning Board shall review and act upon the application. The Zoning Board review shall include but not be limited to navigational safety issues; whether it will produce a detriment to the nearby properties; if the requested application to exceed the limits substantial; if the proposed application adversely affects the physical and environmental conditions in the area and can the relief sought by the applicant be achieved by some other feasible method.*

*iii. In addition to the foregoing, no application for the relief sought hereunder shall be granted without New York State Department of environmental conservation and United States Army Corps of Engineers approval of the maritime structure.*

**SEVERABILITY.**

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or other part of this local law shall for any reason be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalidated such judgment shall not affect impair or invalidate the remainder of this local law and it shall be construed to have been the legislative intent to enact this local law without such constitutional or invalid parts therein.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.**

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon the filing in the Office of the Secretary of State of New York.

Trustee Kehoe corrected some wording in the agenda version of the law – non substantive corrections were made to correct transcription errors and to correct the title of the US Army Corps of Engineers. Attorney Stu Besen commented that he had received an email from Ed Carr, who also commented to clarify the square footage calculation in section 4 and also maintaining consistent language when referring to dock definition and measurement from the MHWL.

On the motion of Trustee Milligan and seconded by Trustee Weber the Public Hearing was closed. The role call was taken and this motion was approved by all.

On the motion of Trustee Kehoe and seconded by Trustee Smith and approved by all, the Law was adopted with the changes recommended in the Public Hearing.

**BUSINESS/COMMISSIONERS REPORTS:**

**Trustee Kehoe:** reported on the status of Outdoor Dining permits – only half of the business needed permits have submitted their application so far. Trustee Kehoe reminded everyone listening that the fee was waived again and he compared the permit to having insurance on a car. If an accident was to happen and the permit was not in place, there could be insurance and other issues. He stated that the process is for the protection of the business owners and reminders would be sent by the clerk's office.

**Trustee Milligan:** reported that repairs were being done by both the village staff as well as an outside company and that the floating dock was expected to be open with a week. He also commented that hiring for Dock Masters and Pump Outpersonnel was being done all at once this year (later in this meeting) and it is imperative to get them onboard as the Town of Huntington has informed us that due to the condition of the Woodbine Marina, they will no longer service the pump out there. We have some regular and reserve hires to have continuity with the service. The Mayor added that Brandt Marine was working emergency repairs to the substructure of the main village dock – a main feature of village that many residents enjoy.

Trustee Smith reported that the hiring for gate attendants and lifeguards was also ready but that the former beach supervisor, Julianne Hayes had completed her PHD and would not be returning this season. Hopefully a replacement will be found by the next BOT meeting. Trustee Smith also reported that she had met with the members of the Rotary and the Village Administrator and Clerk to review the logistics and COVID plans for the “Duck Race”. They submitted a more detailed plan regarding details and timing and it should flow smoothly after the farmers market on Aug 14. Trustee Smith will review their submission and formally approve at the next BOT meeting. She also reported that FLUPSY construction is moving along – lumber has been ordered, the boxes have been delivered and we are working on construction and retrofitting. There is one item to be approved at the Town of Huntington’s May 11<sup>th</sup> meeting for usage of a slip at Woodbine marina to supply electric and fresh water for the pump.

Trustee Weber reported that interviewing will take place next week for the assistant foreman position and once that is filled and the open laborer position is filled, the highway and park departments will be at 100% staffing level with the exception of the summer help that will be coming along shortly.

**TREASURER REPORT:** None

**CHIEF OF POLICE REPORT:** reported that the police boat is being serviced and will be in commission by the weekend. The Mayor commented that it was good timing for the boating season.

**CORRESPONDENCE:** A letter was read from Resident Michael Antico regarding an ongoing problem he has had trying to get 2 horse chestnut trees removed from the village property that are in danger of falling on the brick wall in front of his house. Village clerk Amy Grandy reported that she had confirmed with Highway supervisor Bryan hart that these trees were on his department’s worklist.

**RESOLUTION 2021 – 112 ~ ADOPT LOCAL LAW INTRODUCTORY NO. B-2021 CREATING A LAW WITH REGARD TO OWNERSHIP OF DUCKS, CHICKENS, PIGEONS AND OTHER BIRDS TO BE CODIFIED IN NORTHPORT VILLAGE CODE SECTION 93-7 AND DENOMINATED ARTICLE II THEREIN**

**WHEREAS,** the Village Board of Trustees shall hold a public hearing in accordance with the governor’s executive order 103. the public hearing shall be held via zoom and can be accessed (link to TBA) on the 4<sup>th</sup> day of May, 2021, at 6:00 p.m. to consider adopting Local Law Introductory No. B-2021 to consider creating a Northport Village Code Provision concerning the ownership responsibilities of owners of various birds including but not limited to pigeons, duck, chickens and other birds, and

**WHEREAS,** the scheduling of a public hearing to consider a code amendment is not an action pursuant to SEQRA and no further SEQRA review is required at this time.

**BE IT RESOLVED: THE VILLAGE BOARD HEREBY PROPOSES THE FOLLOWING LOCAL LAW** Introductory No. B-2021; as follows:

Proposed Local Law to add to Local Law Article II Section 93-7:

**Pigeons, Chickens, Ducks and Other Birds**

(A) It shall be unlawful to cause, permit or allow chickens or ducks to be kept in such a manner as to constitute a nuisance or to create a hazard to public health or in any manner which either annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers or tends to annoy, disturb, injure or endanger the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of the public.

(B) Regulations.

- (1) No person shall keep, maintain, house or possess more than eight (8) chicken, pigeons, ducks or birds, or any combination of birds on any premises.
- (2) All pens, coops or houses maintained for the keeping of chickens or ducks in all zoning districts shall comply with the setback and side yard requirements set forth in the Northport Village Zoning Code for an Accessory Structure.
- (3) The pens, coops or houses in which such chickens or ducks are kept must be cleaned regularly and maintained in a sanitary condition, free of refuse, debris and any other dirt or excess foot, so as not to endanger the public health and safety.
- (4) Feed must be stored in metal containers and securely covered with metal covers. Refuse shall be kept in metal containers with metal covers or used as garden compost.
- (5) There shall be no less than three (3) square feet of floor space per chicken or duck in any pen, coop or house in which such chickens or ducks are kept. The pen, coop or house shall be large enough to provide adequate access for cleaning and egg collecting.
- (6) Pens, coops or houses shall be located in rear yards and screened from the view of surrounding residences and surrounding streets by a fence or by shrubs, unless said pen, coop or house is located in such a manner as not be by visible from the surrounding residences and streets.
- (7) Chickens and ducks and all fowl shall be confined at all times to the property on which they are kept, possessed or maintained.
- (8) Any chickens or ducks maintained, housed or possessed and all eggs produced from said chickens, or ducks shall be for the sole use and consumption of the homeowner or tenant in possession and shall not be offered for resale.
- (9) In no instance will roosters be permitted.

A violation of any provision of this Statute shall be subject to a fine of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars. Any second violation of this Statute within a five year period of time shall be subject to a fine of Five Hundred Dollars.

The following resolution 2021-118 was added to the agenda. Mayor McMullen explained background of the opportunity to apply for federal grant funds for remediation of the storm water runoff issues thru Congressman Suozzi that happened the morning of the Board meeting. The resolution is needed to allow the Mayor to sign the application and does not commit the village to accepting the grant money or cost sharing but allows the application to be submitted. Trustee Smith also commented that her call for letters of support was answered by several of the members of the public who were present on the call and she thanked them as well as asked other who hadn't yet sent a letter to do so. The mayor added that the village was also applying for the same grand for the dredging project that is also needed.

On the motion of Trustee Weber and seconded by Trustee Smith the following resolution was unanimously approved:

**RESOLUTION 2021 –118 ~ APPLICATION FOR FUNDING OF AN INFRASTRUCTURE DESIGNATED PROJECT FROM THE US HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE**

**WHEREAS:** The Village of Northport has been informed by Congressman Tom Suozzi's office regarding a grant from the House of Representative's Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

**WHEREAS:** The Village of Northport desires to apply for said grant,

**WHEREAS:** applying for a grant is a type II Action pursuant to 6 N.Y.C.R.R. Section 617.5 c, and therefore, no further SEQRA review is warranted,

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That the Village Board of Trustees authorizes the Mayor to sign an application and/or any and all documents to further the application for funding of infrastructure designated project and submit to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure for the fiscal year 2021/2022 to address and remedy watershed, flooding and water quality issues in the Incorporated Village of Northport.

**PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:**

The first resident to participate was Joseph Sabia who had a question regarding the Kevin O'Neil lawsuit vs. the village. Mr. Sabia asked who was the insurance company and who was the law firm representing them as well as who is the lead attorney. Stu Besen replied that it was Zurich Insurance, with his law firm Milber Makris Plousadis & Seiden, LLP, as the law firm and himself and another partner as the lead attorneys. Mr Sabia commented that he thought that this was odd that Stu gives the village advice as our attorney and then after we get sued, Stu continues in that role of attorney. Mr Sabia acknowledged that this was legal but just wanted to

comment that he thought it was not right. He commented that he felt Stu was “getting it both ways”. Stu replied that this was incorrect and if Zurich wasn’t the insurance carrier, Stu would still be representing the village but at a fee. Mr. Sabia asked if the insurance rates would go up after the lawsuit and Stu replied that he doubted since the lawsuit doesn’t deal with damages- it is an injunctive action and Mr. O’Neill is just looking to get money back. Stu commented that a lot of insurance companies would not have agreed to defend and indemnify the action.

The next resident to participate was Todd Latchford speaking as a member of the Northport Chamber of Commerce and he wanted to express his thanks for the quick turnaround for the waterrun off project and that the Chamber has encouraged all members to voice their support for this effort to help solve a problem that has been around for at least 100 years. The Mayor replied that we are doing all of work and gathering a lot of information to try to get a share of the infrastructure grants. The mayor commented that if we get it, it will be very disruptive but will be worth it for the businesses and the environment although he will miss being able to float down Main St in an inner tube.

The next resident to participate was Effie Huber who wanted to share that the Angels for Warriors will stil be putting up flags – not as many as usual but they will still be displayed. She also discussed some history regarding Bluff Point and how she helped organize an effort in the 70’s to restrict parking. She stated the signs are faded and others are obstructed. The Mayor promised to speak to the Highway supervisor to get these added to his work list. She also asked for a dead end sign to be installed since there is frequently traffic that has to turn around – the Mayor stated that he will have Chief Hughes check into that. Effie’s next item was for Trustee Weber and a comment that there is a fence down and a black storage container in the north corner of the Village Park which abuts Trustee Weber’s business that needs to be repaired. Trustee Smith recognized that this area was damaged by a fallen village tree and Trustee Weber promised to have it fixed the next day. The last item was a street light that has been out for “years” and the Mayor promised to follow up on it.

The last resident to participate was Joe Shramm wanted to thank the village for the great job they did in repairing the side walk on Ocean Ave that had been dug up by SCWA.

Before the meeting adjourned, Trustee Smith announced that she accepted a job opportunity commencing June 1<sup>st</sup> that precludes her from continuing as a trustee and she will be tendering her resignation in the end of May but she promised to give 200% until then. Trustee Weber will be taking over the FLUPSY project. Amy Grandy will be taking over the wellness program. Trustee Smith’s new position will be announced via a press release shortly. She thanked the Mayor for the opportunity he gave her 3 years ago when he first appointed her and she expressed her gratitude to the other trustees, her colleagues, the voters and even her opposition. She looks forwards to serving as a volunteer and will still continue to participate. The Mayor thanked her as well and wished her good luck.
