PRESENT: Mayor McMullen, Trustee Milligan, Trustee Kehoe, Trustee Weber, Village Attorneys Stuart Besen and Edward Gathman, Treasurer Len Marchese, Police Chief Chris Hughes, Assistant to the Mayor Don Tesoriero, Village Clerk Amy Grandy.

OPEN MEETING: Meeting called to order at 6:08pm by Mayor McMullen

SALUTE TO THE FLAG: The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

PROCLAMATION: none

ANNOUNCEMENTS: The Mayor made an announcement in response to a letter from Rabbi Silverman of the ENPT Jewish Center. Rabbi Silverman had written a letter to the Mayor and trustees regarding an incident on Yom Kippur when congregants gathered at the Harbor for the tradition of casting sins were verbally harassed. The Rabbi asked the Mayor to arrange for police presence at future events. The Mayor called the incident despicable, unacceptable and not indicative of the village's attitude and promised that support for future events. Trustee Kehoe commented that this was the second incident and called the behavior un-American. He also spoke with Rabbi Silverman and added that even though our residents may not agree on everything, he felt we all could agree on this.

PRESENTATIONS: Sean O'Malley, a supervisor from the auditing firm of Nawrocki Smith gave a presentation on the Village's 2020-2021 audit. Sean reported on the scope of the audit, services rendered, financial statement highlights, and some findings and recommendations.

Village administrator Roland Buzard reported that the traffic study was not ready yet. A resident asked if someone from Holzmacher would be available to present the study findings and Mr. Buzard agreed to make that happen.

On the motion of Trustee Milligan and seconded by Trustee Kehoe and unanimously approved, the following public hearing was re-adjourned to November 3, 2021.

On the motion of Trustee Kehoe and seconded by Trustee Weber, the following public hearing was re-opened without a complete reading of the proposed legislation:

Continuation of the Public Hearing of September 21, 2021:

THE VILLAGE BOARD HEREBY PROPOSES THE FOLLOWING LOCAL LAW INTRODUCTORY “I” OF 2021 AMENDING CHAPTER 200 (NOISE) OF THE NORTHPORT VILLAGE CODE AND ADDING SECTION 200-25 RESTRICTING THE USE OF GASOLINE -POWERED LEAF BLOWERS IN THE INCORPORATED VILLAGE OF NORTHPORT AND TO ESTABLISH REGULATIONS INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO LIMITING THE TIME AND USE OF THE GASOLINE-POWERED LEAF BLOWERS IN THE INCORPORATED VILLAGE OF NORTHPORT.

The Village Board hereby proposes the following Local Law Introductory “I” of 2021; as follows:

Chapter 200: NOISE

Section 200-25.

A. The Board of Trustees finds that noise emanating from certain conduct, activity or conditions related to the operation of gas-powered leaf blowers unreasonably annoys, disturbs, the comfort health, peace and safety of others within the Village of Northport and such activity shall be restricted as follows:

B. Use of gas-powered leaf blowers shall be restricted as follows:

- 1. The use and operation of gas-powered leaf blowers or diesel- powered leaf blowers shall be prohibited between the dates of June 15 to September 15.*

(i) *For purposes of this section a gasoline or diesel leaf blower shall be defined as any device which is used, designed, or operated to produce a current of air for the purpose of pushing, propelling, or blowing leaves, dirt, gardening and grass clippings and cuttings, refuse or debris.*

C. Gas and diesel-powered leaf blowers may be used from September 16 until June 14 but no earlier than 8:00 a.m. and or later than 6:00 p.m., prevailing time, on any weekday, and no earlier than 9:00 a.m. or later than 5:00 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays and Federal and State holidays.

(i) Notwithstanding the above, a gas or diesel powered leaf blower device may be used by governmental entities on public land; or

(ii) when responding to an emergency or clean-up after a major storm when the Mayor has declared a state of emergency.

(iii) Notwithstanding the above it shall be prohibited for commercial landscapers performing landscaping services to operate and use any gas powered or diesel-powered leaf blower on Sundays and Federal and State holidays before noon or after 5:00 p.m. on Saturdays.

D. Both the owner and operator undertaking, using or causing the conduct, activity or conditions related to the use and operation of a gas- or diesel-powered leaf blower as herein provided shall be deemed to be in violation of the chapter and section. Property owners who cause, permit, or allow a person to engage in such conduct of operating a gas- or diesel-powered leaf blower to occur on his/her property, with or without direct knowledge shall also be deemed to be in violation of this chapter and section.

E. No gasoline or diesel-powered leaf blower may be used unless it meets the current Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) exhaust standards and is operated and maintained in accordance with manufacturer's instructions and specifications.

F. Penalties of an offense of this section shall be governed by Section 200-22 of this chapter.

G. The proposed local law is enacted pursuant to Section 4-412 of the New York State Village Law, as well as Municipal Home Rule Law Sections 10(1)(i) and 10(1) (ii)(a)(1).

H. If any section or subsection, paragraph, clause, phrase or provision of law shall be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction any judgment made thereby shall not affect the validity of this law as a whole, or any part thereof other than the part or provision so adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional.

This local law shall take effect upon the filing with the Secretary of State

Mayor McMullen stated that he felt many of the comments from the last meeting were very helpful, especially regarding permitting landscaping companies and other changes. Trustee Kehoe

also commented that he thought the legislation hadn't been discussed among the trustees enough and he would also welcome feedback from the professional landscapers in the village. The Mayor suggested a meeting which would involve residents and business owners to develop a better law before the spring.

On the motion of Trustee Weber and seconded by Trustee Kehoe and unanimously approved, the public hearing was closed.

BUSINESS/COMMISSIONERS REPORTS:

Trustee Kehoe stated for the record that he did not think that there had been enough discussion among the board regarding the lead blower legislation and that they would need to do a better job to present it again. He also commented that there are several new businesses that are opening on Main Street and excitement is building as the hotel is taking form. He also stated that regarding protests and opinions, he asks everyone to disagree and behave respectfully.

Trustee Milligan reported on two things on the agenda – the pump-out boat grant which comes from the state and is based on the premise that if the service is easily accessible, it prevents people from dumping overboard. Additionally, next year the village is looking to put in a pump-out station which the village is applying for a grant for that as well. After the closing of the Woodbine marina, there is no public facility available at this time. He also mentioned the candidate for the seasonal Police Officer academy is a local person who will be a positive addition to the village.

Trustee Weber reported that the Highway has several projects under way and that the Village Hall beautification project will be starting soon.

TREASURER REPORT: none

CHIEF OF POLICE REPORT: Chief Hughes reported that in September, the Police Department responded to 506 calls for service, issued 132 summonses and made 13 arrests.

RESOLUTION 2021 – 225 ~ ENGINEERING SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH J.R. HOLZMACHER

BE IT RESOLVED: The Mayor is hereby authorized to sign a contract with J.R. Holzmacher P.E., LLC to provide engineering services pursuant to proposal dated September 29, 2021 for the dredging project at 139 Woodbine Ave, Northport, NY.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: The Northport Village Board of Trustees has determined that this action is a type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR part 617.5 (c) 26,32 and not subject to any further action under SEQRA.

On the motion of Trustee Milligan and seconded by Trustee Weber, the following resolution was unanimously approved without complete reading.

RESOLUTION 2021 – 226 ~ JOINDER AGREEMENT WITH RESIDENT STEPHEN TYRER

BE IT RESOLVED: The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute an agreement with Stephen Tyrer of 139 Woodbine Ave, Northport, NY 11768 for a joinder agreement whereby Mr. Tyrer agrees to reimburse Northport Village for services provided by J.R. Holzmacher P.E., LLC for the dredging of 139 Woodbine Ave, Northport, NY subject to attorney review for form and substance, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: The Village Board of Trustees authorizes the treasurer to create a trust fund account for Tyrer Dredging Project initial deposit in an amount not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for outside consultant, J.R. Holzmacher P.E., LLC.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: The Northport Village Board of Trustees has determined that this action is a type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR part 617.5 (c) 26,32 and not subject to any further action under SEQRA.

Mayor McMullen commented that the Village had to get involved in this project since the underwater property is owned both privately and by the Town of Huntington. Don Tesoriero added that the land the Mr. Tyrer is looking to put a bulkhead and dock on property that abut the sewer plant. The engineering company is being engaged to ensure that the construction does not jeopardize our infrastructure that runs along the shore line.

On the motion of Trustee Weber and seconded by Trustee Milligan, the following resolution was unanimously approved without complete reading.

RESOLUTION 2021 – 227 ~ CLEAN VESSEL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM OPERATION & MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT

BE IT RESOLVED: The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute the Clean Vessel Assistance Program Operation & Maintenance Grant Agreement with the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation for financial assistance with the construction, renovation, operation and maintenance of pump-out and dump stations to improve water quality; surveying existing pump-out and dump stations; and implementing education programs to increase public awareness of the use and availability of pump-out and dump stations to receive sewage waste from marine recreational vessels, for the years 2021 – 2025, subject to attorney review for form and content,

and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: The Northport Village Board of Trustees has determined that this action is a type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR part 617.5 (c) 26,32 and not subject to any further action under SEQRA.

On the motion of Trustee Milligan and seconded by Trustee Weber, the following resolution was unanimously approved without complete reading.

RESOLUTION 2021 –228 ~ SPONSORSHIP OF CANDIDATE FOR THE SUFFOLK COUNTY SEASONAL POLICE OFFICER’S ACADEMY

WHEREAS: Shelby Stillwagon was interviewed by the Chief of Police and was determined to meet the qualifications necessary of a seasonal Police Officer;

WHEREAS: Candidate Stillwagon’s uniforms and duty gear will be supplied by the Village while attending the academy

WHEREAS: Candidate Stillwagon will not be paid during her instruction at the academy,

WHEREAS: the Village Board of Trustees has determined that this employment action is a type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR part 617.5 (c) 26 and not subject to any further action under SEQRA;

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Village Board of Trustees approves the sponsorship of Shelby Stillwagon to attend the Suffolk County Police Seasonal Police Officer’s Academy on or about October 30th, 2021 contingent upon completion of a background investigation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that upon successful completion of the academy and field training, Shelby Stillwagon will be hired as a part time / seasonal police officer with the Northport Police Department.

On the motion of Trustee Weber and seconded by Trustee Milligan, the following resolution was unanimously approved without complete reading.

RESOLUTION: 2021 – 229 ~ REPLACEMENT OF DRAINAGE SYSTEM

WHEREAS: Bensin Contracting, Inc. has inspected the drainage pump system on Ocean Ave at Steers Avenue and has determined that the entire system requires immediate replacement, and

WHEREAS: The Village Administrator has informed the Village Board of Trustees of the in operatable condition of the pumps;

WHEREAS: The Village Administrator has evaluated the quote provided by Bensin Contracting, Inc. and determined that the best course of action is replacement with new pumps, at a cost of \$12,475.00,

WHEREAS: this is a type II action pursuant to 6 N.Y.C.R.R. Section 617.5(c)(31), and, therefore, no further SEQRA review is required, now therefore.

BE IT RESOLVED: The Village Board has determined that this purchase is an emergency purchase, pursuant to the Village of Northport Procurement Policy - item 6b, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Village Board of Trustees authorizes the Village Administrator to sign any necessary contracts with Bensin Contracting, Inc. for the replacement of the drainage pump system on Ocean Avenue at Steers Avenue, and hereby authorizes the Village Treasurer to make all necessary transfers to fund this purchase.

Mayor McMullen clarified that this is for a storm drain pump and pipes and not part of the sewer system and was installed many years ago that moves storm water thru an area by Nautilus and Dolphin Avenues.

On the motion of Trustee Kehoe and seconded by Trustee Weber, the following resolution was

unanimously approved.

RESOLUTION: 2021 – 230 ~ CARRYOVER OF VACATION

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Village Board of Trustees authorizes the following Fire Department Housemen to carry over 10 days’ vacation into 2022. The carried over days must be utilized within 6 months of the new year.

RESOLUTION 2021 - 231 ~ BUDGET TRANSFERS

BE IT RESOLVED: The Village Board of Trustees hereby authorizes various budget transfers per schedule A, which is annexed to this agenda and incorporated herein.

On the motion of Trustee Kehoe and seconded by Trustee Milligan, the following resolution was unanimously approved without complete reading.

RESOLUTION 2021 – 232 ~ PARAMEDIC

WHEREAS: Eric Nazinitsky has applied to be a per diem Paramedic for the Village of Northport, now therefore

WHEREAS: the Village Board of Trustees has determined that the action is a type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR part 617.5 (c) 26 and not subject to any further action under SEQRA;

BE IT RESOLVED: Eric Nazinitsky is hereby hired for the position of Paramedic for the Incorporated Village of Northport, and as with all applicants, Eric Nazinitsky will be subject to a background check and confirmation of all certifications necessary to hold the position of Paramedic, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: Paramedic Eric Nazinitsky will work no more than 17.5 hours a week at a rate of pay of \$32.00 per hour.

On the motion of Trustee Milligan and seconded by Trustee Kehoe, the following resolution was unanimously approved.

RESOLUTION 2021 - 233 ~ FIRE MARSHAL

BE IT RESOLVED: Gregg Suriano, Jr. is hereby appointed to the position of Fire Marshal, pending the outcome of a background check with a term to expire at the annual organizational meeting April 2022, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: Gregg Suriano, Jr. will be compensated at \$40.00/hr. not to exceed 17.5 hours a week, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: the Village Board of Trustees has determined that the action is a type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR part 617.5 (c) 26 and not subject to any further action under SEQRA

Trustee eber asked Roland Buzard if this was the standard rate of pay for this position and

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:

The first resident to speak was Ralph Notaristefano who requested that the board meetings be held remotely for the remainder of the year as per the Governor’s revised year. The Mayor responded that the two meetings in November would be offered with both in person and remote access and the village clerk was exploring ways to have them successfully transmitted. Mayor

McMullen acknowledged that there are additional costs for equipment and services so transmission can be done more successfully than in the past. Mr. Notaristefano also asked that the agendas for those meetings be kept lighter to allow for time for discussion of the upcoming marijuana sales legislation.

The next resident to speak was Joe Sabia who asked if Sam Luby was allowed on the Fish Market property and why the condemnation signs had been removed from the building. The Mayor responded that the access issue had been straightened out and the signs had to be removed to allow the licensed contractors to go on property to do the permitted work.

Giuseppe Clemente spoke next and asked if there were any plans for the village to evaluate the erosion of his property at 20 Washington Place and he offered that he had a contact at County Soil and Erosion office who was available at no charge. Attorney Stu Besen confirmed that there was a Notice of Claim filed by the homeowner and there was a 50H hearing and it is now up to the homeowner to take the next step. The Mayor stated that the village has not been provided with any documents from the county and Mr. Clemente responded that the County has to be invited to do an evaluation. Trustee Kehoe clarified that once the notice of claim was filed, it is now an insurance issue. Mr. Besen stated that the attorney representing the village stated that liability hasn't been established and the village cannot fix private property without having been found to have done something wrong civilly.

The next resident to speak was Effie Huber who asked about the timeline for the steep slope construction on Rutledge Ave. Village Administrator Roland Buzard stated that there are no signs of erosion and they have haybale and silt fencing in place as protection. Don Tesoriero commented that the permit is renewable at one year and can be renewed if the project is progressing. She also asked about the sewer project at Bluff Point and Roland Buzard responded that they are still working on permissions and are still missing three. Her last question was regarding the cut through in the corner of Village Park and Trustee Weber responded that he and Roland Buzard were looking at options.

Next was Josephine Rizzoni who also asked about Zoom options for the meeting and the Mayor again responded that the November Meetings were the goal. She also asked about retaining wall construction and Roland Buzard responded that it is a logistical issue regarding when heavy equipment and property access is needed and retaining walls could be an encumbrance. She also asked if the property on Washington Ave could be remedied by a retaining wall and Trustee Milligan responded that a wall was already in place there and that wasn't the issue in that case and that the trustees are acting to protect all village residents due to the action taken against the village.

Next was resident Joe Schramm who made a statement regarding his respect for free speech and the right to protest but he wanted to report that on Saturday morning (10/xx) he was surrounded and intimidated by protestors who were at his neighbor's house to protest the implementation of the Governor's vaccine mandate and Northwell Health's subsequent layoff of unvaccinated workers. He felt he was targeted as a Democratic candidate for the Town of Huntington town council. He stated that the police responded quickly and he thanked the officers who disbursed the crowd. He stated that there was also a social media post of his personal information and invited protestors to continue to harass him. The Mayor stated that recent actions are unsettling but protestors have the right to be there and the police will continue to deal with it as best they can. Trustee Kehoe added that the protest started at the Ocean Ave residence of Michael Dowling who is the CEO of Northwell Health.

The next resident to speak was Blair Beaudet who asked for follow up on a past warrant regarding a payment to Tim a Tree and he asked who had the responsibility to remove a

stump that is on the edge of his neighbor's property and Trustee Weber offered to follow up. He also asked about a slab that was laid by the Plank House to which the Mayor replied that it was the base for the building's emergency generator. He also asked if benefits were given to the employee who recently resigned from the treasurer's office and the Mayor replied that that was an ongoing legal issue.

Next to speak was Sam Luby who apologized to the Board and community for what had gone on at Northport Fish and Lobster and thanked the building department for their help in getting the correct work done and he stated that they are trying to get the store back on track.

Next to speak was Michael Bento who also commented on the protesters and the limits of freedom of speech and the issues of one of the protestors carrying a sign with a swastika and crowding on the street and blocking the sidewalk and street access. The mayor commented that they hadn't broken any laws. Joe Sabia added to the subject and asked if the Mayor could define what kinds of speech are allowed. Attorney Stu Besen commented that constitutional law is a complicated topic but briefly summarized that different types of speech have different types of protection – such as political speech or journalism. He said municipalities can regulate time, place and permits and protests are allowed as long as safety isn't an issue. It is up to the police to treat all groups as fairly as possible.

Next to speak was John Kirby who briefly spoke on the noise legislation and commented that he felt all contractors doing business in the village should be permitted, not just landscapers and that the existing noise law should be enforced in general and not just targeted to one industry.

Next to speak was Megan Saporita who is a resident and a founding member of NOIT Northport (Not in Our Town). She read a prepared statement as a representative of the organization regarding the protest and an incident with a resident who was out running and had trouble navigating the sidewalk and the protestors. She reported that this resident spoke to police and the officer responded with a BLM reference. The resident felt ignored and that the response was not appropriate. She asked the village to make a statement in response to this incidence. Trustee Kehoe responded that the village has made a response and Ms. Saporita asked for more. Chief Hughes commented that he would like the resident to meet with him personally to discuss the incidence and he reported that the group was responsive to the police directions regarding the sidewalk access and that the use of the hate signs on signs is a different issue and that a prior incident on one of the school playgrounds was vandalism.

Next to speak was Ray Gneiser who asked to clarify what access Sam Luby has to the fish market property. Stu Besen responded that Mr. Luby was given permission to remove his boat and trailer, although not multiple times. Mr. Besen added that Sam's presence on the property is a civil issue, not criminal and the process would be to pursue a contempt complaint would be very difficult. Mr. Besen confirmed that the property is still considered unsafe and limited activity is being allowed to help restore it and not much else can be done at this point.

Next to speak was Doug Roberts who distributed copies of the Village Code – Chapter 256 and referenced section 5 regarding parades and section 10a regarding safe intersections. He spoke that there were options regarding controlling the protests. Mr. Besen responded that a municipality walks a fine line regarding peaceful protests and liability in attempting to stop political speech. Mr. Roberts asked the purpose of the Village Code and referred back to an unpermitted car parade in 2020 and the mayor responded that the mission of the village was to protect the residents and mitigate situations as best as possible. Mr. Roberts asked for the

mayor and trustees to publicize their positions and to consider rewriting the code to address these situations.

The last resident to speak was Sharon Richmond who thanked the village for allowing the task force to turn the Village purple and asked for more participation next year. The mayor advised her to start her planning earlier and to reach out to the Board and Parks Commissioner as early as possible. She also voiced her support of a return to Zoom access as well.

MOTION FOR AN EXECUTIVE SESSION: A motion was made by Trustee Milligan and seconded by Trustee Kehoe for an executive session for contractual issues and litigation matters with no action taken.

The next meeting of the Board of Trustees will be October 19, 2021 at 6:00 PM.
